

Money Vocabulary for Grade 1 to Grade 3

We'll be using these words in our All About Money program. Take some time to read them before we meet with you.

Bank notes: the polymer money we use in Canada

Barter: trading an object for another object instead of paying for it with money

Counterfeit: an object that is fake, especially money

Currency: the type of money used in a country or area

Divisible: can be divided or made into smaller pieces

Durable: strong and not easy to break

Polymer: a special type of plastic used for Canadian bank notes

Portable: easy to carry

Product: an object made by someone

Rare: something that is hard to find or hard to get, because there aren't many of them

Service: something that someone does for you

Value: how much something is worth

Nickel: 5¢ coin Dime: 10¢ coin Quarter: 25¢ coin **Dollars** Loonie: \$1 coin Toonie: \$2 coin

Canadian bank notes
